

5 STEPS TO IMPROVE STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

1.	ESTABLISH A COMMON VISION AND MISSION
	Work with the end in mind. What does an ideal school look like? How do you envision your school? What do you hope to achieve?
	Invite stakeholder input (e.g., leadership team, PTO, students, faculty, partners in education, etc.).
	All school processes operate to execute a school's vision and mission.
	Spread the word. Encourage all stakeholders to internalize and implement the vision and mission.
2.	INTERNALIZE YOUR SCHOOL'S DATA
	Know how your school is performing (e.g., achievement, strengths, and weaknesses).
	Know how to disaggregate assessment data (e.g., benchmarks and state assessments).
	Analyze your school's data (e.g., Look at patterns in terms of teachers, grade levels, subjects, and subgroups).
	Develop and implement a plan for remediation or acceleration for further growth.
3.	CREATE A COLLABORATIVE CULTURE
	Move away from isolation.
	Create a culture where stakeholders feel valued, supported, empowered, and heard. Celebrate success.
	Provide collaborative planning time for teachers. Afford teachers an opportunity to meet with their colleagues to build relationships, discuss data and student achievement, plan units, and discuss best practices.
	Build teacher capacity.
4.	EVALUATE YOUR SCHOOL'S PROCESSES
	Look critically at your school's procedures (e.g., attendance, behavior, scheduling, MTSS, safety, and extra- curricular activities).
	Determine whether your school's processes are efficient and effective. Amend them if needed.
5.	PROVIDE PROFESSIONAL LEARNING AND RESOURCES
	Be passionate about professional learning. Create a culture that embraces lifelong learning.
	Ensure that professional learning is engaging, ongoing, and relevant. Purchase, train staff, and utilize resources.
